Bishop Sutton to lead pre-Lenten clergy retreat

The annual Ministry Discernment Conference takes place on *Saturday, Feb. 3, 8:30 a.m.-2:30 p.m.*, at the Cathedral Church of St. Paul (138 Tremont Street) in Boston. This conference is offered by the bishops and the Commission on Ministry and is intended to provide an in-depth look at the 2018 Ministry Discernment Handbook and to give potential applicants to the ordination process an opportunity to explore their sense of call and whether that call is to ordained ministry or committed lay ministry.

Any person considering applying for admission to the ordination process in 2018 is required to attend the conference, along with his or her sponsoring priest and at least one member of the Parish Discernment Committee.

• Bishop Alan M. Gates will be among the leaders participating in a **vigil honoring victims of gun violence**, taking place on *Thursday, Dec. 14, 6:15 p.m.*, at First Church (66 Marlborough Street) in Boston. The service will include special candle lighting for 2017 Boston victims of gun violence, and is envisioned as a memorial to all victims and as a call for further commitment to work to reduce gun violence in all communities. The diocese's B-PEACE for Jorge antiviolence campaign and the Massachusetts Coalition to Prevent Gun Violence are sponsors of the vigil. All are invited to come and join in prayer and a call to action.

• The Cathedral Church of St. Paul (138 Tremont Street) in Boston will host a Confirmation service open to confirmands from all deaneries, on *Saturday, Jan. 27*. The service begins at 10:30 a.m.; Bishop Alan M. Gates will meet with the confirmands at 9:30 a.m. **Those intending to participate should register their confirmands as soon as possible** by contacting the cathedral administrator, Ethel Crawford. Confirmands' names, as they should be printed in the bulletin, are needed at least two weeks prior to the service.

• Online filing for the 2017 Parochial Report begins on

Jan. 4. Again this year, each congregation will receive a mailing from the Episcopal Church that includes the congregation's online ID and PIN information for accessing the filing site; paper copies of the Parochial Report form are no longer being mailed.

The Parochial Report form (including instructions and workbooks for each page) will be available <u>here</u> for those congregations that are not able to file online or that need to submit a paper copy.

Changes to the 2017 Parochial Report form mandated by General Convention Resolution A084 include a revised membership page, an opportunity to report the languages in which worship is conducted and an "Outreach Ministries and Volunteer" section. • The Boston University School of Theology has announced the formation of two new denominational learning communities, one in collaboration with the Diocese of Massachusetts and another with the Massachusetts Conference of the United Church of Christ.

The Anglican Episcopal Community of Learning is a collaboration with the Diocese of Massachusetts and other interested dioceses, churches and organizations that wish to network and partner with the School of Theology. The learning community mission is to form a community of students, faculty

and staff dedicated to nurturing and preparing Episcopalians and other Anglicans for future leadership and service in and through the church. It seeks to nurture the next generation of leaders, equipping them in both Anglican and ecumenical traditions of Christianity and providing them with curricular and co-curricular opportunities to ground their academic, spiritual, ecclesial, professional and social-global growth.

This community of learning will be initiated and developed in communication with Episcopal dioceses that are willing to collaborate in developing a program that serves the needs of their students, particularly those students preparing for ordination. The collaboration is initially focused in the Diocese of Massachusetts and in others in Provinces I and II. More details are available at <u>www.bu.edu/sth/ecl</u>.

CHURCHWIDE:

• A **new Advent resource, "Preparing to Become the Beloved Community,**" has been developed by the Episcopal Church's Racial Reconciliation Team and is designed for group use among all ages. Every congregation will receive in the mail "Preparing to Become the Beloved Community," as well as a poster and resource pack with prayers, reflections and activities for each week of Advent. The resource can also be downloaded <u>here</u>.

Throughout Advent, an Episcopal Church social media campaign also aims to stir hope, reflection and action around racial reconciliation; join or follow using the hashtag **#adventbeloved**.

Episcopal Migration Ministries is offering a six-week Epiphany curriculum designed for adult Christian formation and ideal for congregations, individuals, adult forums, discussion groups and other church-based gatherings. It aims to help participants come away with a deeper understanding of Episcopal Migration Ministries, refugee resettlement, the stories of new American neighbors and God's call to this work. • Episcopalians across the church are invited to **review and provide input on the preliminary draft of the 2019-2021 triennium budget**. Following the comment period, the preliminary draft budget will be prepared for approval by the Episcopal Church's Executive Council at its January 2018 meeting. From there, the Executive Council will present the draft budget to the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance in February, which will then prepare a final budget for approval at General Convention next summer. • Applications are being accepted through Dec. 15 for **Episcopal Church Evangelism Grants**. Application information is available <u>here</u>. The grant program is designed to fund local and regional evangelism efforts in the Episcopal Church. Episcopal institutions (congregations, dioceses, provinces, schools, monastic communities, Episcopal organizations and other Episcopal Churchaffiliated entities) are eligible to receive these funds. Grants are available for up to \$2,000 for an individual congregation and up to \$8,000 for multichurch, diocesan and regional collaborations. TRAINING & LEARNING:

• Space is limited and time is running out to apply to join the 2018 **Las Fronteras youth pilgrimage**, *Aug. 3-10*. Building on the success of recent youth mission trips to the borderlands of Arizona and Sonora, Mexico, the program, open to current 9th and 10th graders, will include several mandatory organizational meetings ahead of the trip along with meetings after the trip to connect the new understandings gained with activities ongoing around the diocese. • Join Bishop Gayle E. Harris and the congregation of St. Luke's-San Lucas Church in Chelsea on *Saturday*, *Dec. 16*, *6:30-9 p.m.*, for **Las Posadas**, a traditional Advent event at which those gathered will trace Mary and Joseph's traveling search for shelter. This is a bilingual and multicultural celebration with processions, music, food and hospitality. As the group celebrates this well-known story from the Christian tradition, it will hold close in heart and mind the serious situation of modern-day refugees seeking shelter. • Registration is now open for the 2018 **High School Retreat weekend**, *Friday-Sunday*, *Feb. 2-4* at the Barbara C. Harris Camp and Conference Center in Greenfield, N.H. The retreat's theme is "An Ocean of Possibilities." Participants will explore how they are formed by their culture and by their faith for action in the world.

Led by the Diocesan Youth Council, the weekend features small group workshops, indoor and outdoor games, worship to get everyone moving and thinking, lively music and some muchneeded time away from the rush of everyday routines. • Clergy interested in elder issues are invited to earn a **free certificate in behavioral health and aging**, sponsored this winter by Boston University's Center for Aging and Disability Education and Research. The 19-hour online course runs from the end of January through May, and includes five subject areas: mental health and aging issues (four hours in length); suicide prevention among older adults (four hours); mental wellness and resilience among older immigrants and refugees (three hours); substance abuse among older adults (four hours). • The U.S. Attorney's Office, Department of Homeland Security, Department of Justice, FBI and Massachusetts Executive Office of Public Safety and Security are sponsoring a **day-long forum on public safety crises specifically for houses of worship and faith communities**. Faith leaders and other individuals responsible for emergency management at houses of worship are invited to attend the forum, to be held on *Thursday, Jan. 11* at the Holiday Inn in Taunton and again on *Friday, Jan. 19* at the Reading Public Library. The forum aims to increase participants' understanding of various public safety concerns and knowledge about planning and preparing for an active threat, and to provide tools to build an emergency operations plan. Issues like vandalism, arson, Internet scams, cyber threats, bomb threats, active shooter situations and hate crimes will be covered. Pre-registration is required via the date links above.
