Mission strategy listening team to make initial report in April

Summary timeline:

January-February: Open forums, focus groups, online & phone surveys

March:

Listening team compiles themes from forums & surveys into initial report

April: Initial report issued & open response period

Gather for "Our Global Mission Journey" on April 9

Good participation, in both numbers and spirit, has the diocese's mission strategy listening process on a successful track so far, according to members of the design team that hosted open forums around the diocese in January and February. More than 550 people representing 100-plus congregations attended the first six open forums, and, as of the week before surveys closed, more than 300 online responses had been received.

The team will now compile and code transcripts and survey responses, identify common themes and make an initial report for the diocesan community's review in April. Several open meetings will be scheduled in April to give everyone an opportunity to respond to the initial report; there will also be an online response option. Details will be announced as soon as they become available.

After the public response period in April, the team will make any necessary revisions to the initial report, and then will hand the revised report off to the working group that will actually draft the new mission strategy. That group, soon to be named, will comprise approximately 14 people, half appointed by the Diocesan Council and half appointed by Bishop Alan M. Gates, to help ensure wellrounded representation of the diocese as a whole.

• "Our journey as Episcopalians also includes remembering our sister and brother Christians in the Holy Land who maintain the faith which we hold so dear," Presiding Bishop Michael B. Curry said in the annual letter to all congregations asking them to consider assistance for Jerusalem and the Middle East through the **Good Friday Offering**.

"This tradition is decades old and is an important statement of our solidarity with the members of the four dioceses of the Province of Jerusalem and the Middle East. We have a Gospel imperative to be sure they know they are not forgotten behind the headlines or because of the distractions in our own lives," Curry said.

• The **Anglican Consultative Council** (ACC) will meet in Lusaka, Zambia, for its 16th triennial meeting, April 8-20. In a Feb. 25 Anglican Communion News Service release, the secretary general of the Anglican Communion, Archbishop Josiah Idowu-Fearon, asks "all our members in every province, as well as our ecumenical partners" to join in prayer "as we prepare for the meeting of this instrument of our Communion." The ACC's role, in part, is to facilitate the cooperative work of the churches of the Anglican Communion, and it advises on the communion's organization and structures.

There is heightened interest in the upcoming April meeting, given the January call from the Anglican Communion's primates for a temporary restriction of the Episcopal Church's participation in certain representative and decision-making bodies.
