"Our Stories Speak of God": Spring Learning Event aims to inspire everywhere-evangelists

This year's annual Spring Learning Event—*Saturday, March 4*, 9 a.m.-3 p.m., at the Cathedral Church of St. Paul (138 Tremont Street) in Boston—draws from the call in the diocese's new mission strategy to "deepen our relationship with God and increase our capacity to speak of our faith."

Titled "Our Stories Speak of God," the event will feature as keynoter the Rev. Hershey Mallette Stephens, who will lead an interactive workshop in two parts: The first will help those gathered to learn about story, narrative and myth and how they function in faith and to consider what our stories say about who we are and how we understand God and the church. During part two, participants will engage their spiritual imaginations and learn how storytelling can redefine evangelism.

Stephens is on the staff at Trinity Church, Wall Street in New York City and has led several workshops for groups across the Episcopal Church, including the recent "Evangelism Matters" conference in Texas.

Everyone is invited to come share, learn and be inspired by the way our stories speak of the goodness of God in our time.

New deans, co-conveners announced

In a Jan. 17 e-mail announcement to deanery leaders, Bishop Alan M. Gates confirmed the following appointments of new deans: The Rev. Martha Hubbard, Rector of St. Paul's Church in Newburyport, to serve the Merrimack Valley Deanery, and the Rev. Clyde Elledge, Rector of St. Andrew's Church in Marblehead, to serve the North Shore Deanery. "Their commitment to their deaneries and respective communities, and their deep collegiality with their fellow clergy will be a blessing to us all," Gates said.

They succeed the Rev. Ennis Duffis, Rector of St. Anne's Church and Priest-in-Charge of St. John's Church in Lowell, who served as the Merrimack Valley dean for seven years, and the Rev. Jane Gould, Rector of St. Stephen's Church in Lynn, who served as the North Shore dean, also for seven years. "Their skillful guidance and pastoral presence as deans will be greatly missed," Gates said.

Additionally, co-conveners have been appointed for the Council of Deans, new leadership positions created to assist the bishops in assuring that the deans' gatherings and collective ministry will be directed toward those matters deemed most important to both deans and bishops. The new co-conveners are the Rev. Jeffrey Mello, Rector of St. Paul's Church in Brookline, of the Charles River Deanery and the Rev. Kate Malin, Rector of St. Anne's-in-the-Fields Church in Lincoln, of the Concord River Deanery.

- Does your church have an elevator and/or chair lift? The proper maintenance of elevators and chair lifts, their annual inspection by a licensed elevator inspection company and the inspection and permitting by the Board of Elevator Regulations is Massachusetts law, and churches are not exempt. Failure to meet these requirements can lead to significant fines. Churches with an elevator and/or chair lift are urged to:
- Confirm that the church has a contract with a licensed elevator inspection/repair firm for an annual inspection.
- Confirm that the church's permit is affixed so that it can be seen and is located in or near the elevator or chair lift.
- Working with the elevator inspection firm, ensure that the permit is current, be aware of its expiration date and apply for reinspection 60 days before the expiration date. Keep a record of the reinspection request as proof that the church filed for such within the legal time frame, as it is possible that the actual reinspection could fall outside of the 60-day window.
