Prepare for Diocesan Convention at a forum this month.

The 232nd annual Diocesan Convention will take place *Saturday*, *Nov. 4* at the Cathedral Church of St. Paul (138 Tremont Street) in Boston. Convention materials and registration information will be posted online on Oct. 5 at www.diomass.org/diocesan-convention-2017. Printed copies of the materials will be available at the pre-convention forums and at the convention on Nov. 4.

Ecumenical retreat helps make the "Creation Connection"

"Making the Creation Connection: Christians and Environmental Justice," a day-long retreat led by the Rev. Margaret Bullitt-Jonas, will offer participants a three-part framework toward transforming hearts and minds about Christians' environmental responsibility and inspiring bold and faithful action on climate and environmental issues. With seven Christian judicatories, including the Diocese of Massachusetts, and the Massachusetts Council of Churches coming together to sponsor the retreat, it is an ecumenical opportunity for Christian denominations to unite and explore their role and responsibility as God's people to care for creation. The intention for this event is both to help Christians connect their faith with environmental justice, and to connect Christians with other Christians who care for the planet.

The retreat takes place on *Saturday, Nov. 11, 9:30 a.m.-4 p.m.*, at the Rolling Ridge Retreat and Conference Center in North Andover. Registration can be found online at www.rollingridge.org. • In a "Word to the Church" statement issued Sept. 27 from their meeting in Fairbanks, Alaska, the Episcopal Church's bishops urge Episcopalians to look "for the connections among race, violence of every kind, economic disparity and the environment. "God calls us to listen to each other with increased attention. It is only with unstopped ears and open eyes that our hearts and lives will be changed. It is through the reconciling love of God in Jesus and the power of the Holy Spirit that we and the earth itself will be healed."

This training is designed to increase awareness regarding sexual misconduct and abuse of power, to outline steps toward preventing abuse, to offer ways to intervene when misconduct occurs and to equip anyone in a position of parish leadership with ways of healing and rebuilding the body of Christ.
