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Meet Presiding Bishop Michael B. Curry

The Most Rev. Michael Bruce Curry is the presiding bishop and primate of the Episcopal Church. He is the chief pastor and serves as president and chief executive officer--sometimes quipping that CEO stands for "chief evangelism officer."

The Episcopal Church has heard Bishop Curry herald the message of God's unconditional love ever since he was elected presiding bishop in July 2015. Last May, his message went global and viral when he preached at the royal wedding of Prince Harry and Meghan Markle, and in December, it earned him the title of "religious newsmaker of the year" from the Religion News Association.

The descendant of enslaved Africans brought to North America by way of the trans-Atlantic slave routes, Bishop Curry was born in Chicago, Ill., in 1953. His father was an Episcopal priest and his mother was a devout Episcopalian. She died at a young age, and Bishop Curry, along with his sister, was raised by his father and grandmother who grounded him in Christian beliefs and practices through their example and teachings.

He was ordained to the priesthood in 1978 in Winston-Salem, N.C., by the Rt. Rev. John M. Burgess, the then-retired bishop of Massachusetts, and served in parish ministry in North Carolina, Ohio and Maryland before his election as the 11th bishop of the Diocese of North Carolina in 2000.

He and his spouse, Sharon, have two adult daughters, Rachel and Elizabeth.

In his opening sermon at last summer's General Convention, Bishop Curry challenged every Episcopalian to embrace a "Way of Love" set of seven spiritual practices for a Jesus-centered life: "I want to ask not only you, but every Episcopalian, to make a commitment to throw yourself into the hands of Jesus, and then live life out of that."

Way of Love: Practices for a Jesus-Centered Life



- **TURN:** Pause, listen and choose to follow Jesus.
- **LEARN:** Reflect on Scripture each day, especially on Jesus' life and teachings.
- **PRAY:** Dwell intentionally with God daily.
- **WORSHIP:** Gather in community weekly to thank, praise and dwell with God.
- **BLESS:** Share faith and unselfishly give and serve.
- **GO:** Cross boundaries, listen deeply and live like Jesus.
- **REST:** Receive the gift of God's grace, peace and restoration.
