Mission strategy initial report now available

Summary timeline:

January-February: Open forums, focus groups, online & phone surveys

March:

Listening team compiles themes from forums & surveys into initial report

April: Initial report issued & open response period

May:

Listening team hands off revised report to mission strategy drafting group appointed by Diocesan Council and Bishop Gates

Summer-Early fall: Draft mission strategy issued & open response period

September:

Diocesan Council receives proposed mission strategy

November:

Mission strategy comes before Diocesan Convention for final approval The diocesan mission strategy listening team has issued its initial report and invites the diocesan community's response—in person, online or by phone. The initial report is posted at <u>www.diomass.</u> <u>org/new-mission-strategy</u>.

Four open forums have been scheduled at locations around the diocese, at which the team will present its initial findings and invite further conversation. Online and phone response options will also be available during the two-week response period, April 10-24. The link and toll-free number will be posted at www.diomass.org/new-mission-strategy.

The four open forums will take place on:

- Sunday, April 10, 2:30-4 p.m., at Trinity Church (124 River Road) in Topsfield;
- Saturday, April 16, 10-11:30 a.m., at Trinity Church (parish house entrance at 206 Clarendon Street) in Boston;
- Sunday, April 17, 3-4:30 p.m., at St. Christopher's Church (625 Main Street) in Chatham; and
- Saturday, April 23, 1-2:30 p.m., at the Church of Our Saviour (120 Center Street) in Middleborough.

After the public response period in April, the team will make any necessary revisions to the initial report. It will then hand off its revised report to the team that will actually draft the new mission strategy (see below).

The mission strategy drafting team appointed by Diocesan Council and Bishop Alan M. Gates has been announced.

The drafting team will be responsible for the third and final phase of the process that is underway to create a new mission strategy for the Diocese of Massachusetts. Its job is to write a draft mission strategy that responds to the revised report that it will receive in May from the listening team. The drafting team's work will also be informed by demographic and other data related to the diocese and the wider Episcopal Church, as well as previous iterations of diocesan mission strategies. In collaboration with the bishops, the team is to develop its draft by early summer, in time to invite feedback from the diocesan community before the proposed mission strategy goes before the Diocesan Council in early fall and then to the Diocesan Convention for final approval in November. *FOR INFORMATION: Listening Process Design Team at diomasslistening@gmail.com; www.diomass.org/new-missionstrategy*.

Join the Diocese of Massachusetts' B-PEACE team on *Sunday*, *May 8* for the annual Mother's Day Walk for Peace, this year marking its 20th anniversary. The pledge walk is a fundraiser for the <u>Louis D. Brown Peace Institute</u>, which offers services to families that have lost someone to violence. It also provides peace curricula to students of all ages.

The diocesan B-PEACE for Jorge team's organizers hope this year to have 400 walkers and raise at least \$2,000 for the Louis D. Brown Peace Institute. This will be the fourth year that Episcopalians have rallied as a team to walk as a witness for peace and show support for all who are affected by violence.

The walk route is different this year. The walk will step off at 8 a.m., as usual, from Town Field Park in Dorchester, but instead of looping back to the park, it will end at Boston City Hall Plaza with an 11 a.m. rally and closing ceremony. Join Episcopal Church's witness at Mother's Day Walk for Peace

The 2017 diocesan budgeting process is underway, and the Budget Diocesan budget Committee invites participation and input from the diocesan hearings scheduled community. Two hearings have been scheduled for representatives from **strategic ministries** to present their required request reports: Tuesday, May 10 and Wednesday, May 18, both from 7 to 9 p.m., at the Cathedral Church of St. Paul (138 Tremont Street) in Boston. An open hearing on all aspects of the diocesan budget will also be offered, on Tuesday, June 7, 7-9 p.m., at the Cathedral Church of St. Paul. Curry has called for a season **CHURCHWIDE:** of prayer for regions of the Anglican Communion which are experiencing violence and civil strife. "In this season of resurrection, I call on everyone to pray for our brothers and sisters in areas where there is much burden and little hope," he said in a March 29 announcement issued by the Episcopal Church's Office of Public Affairs. Throughout the Easter season, Episcopalians are asked to lift up in prayer parts of the world where there is unrest and to learn more about what the churches in those regions are doing to be sources of support and hope. Resources will be posted online here as the season progresses, focusing on Burundi, Central America, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, the Middle East, Pakistan and South Sudan. • The General Convention Advisory Group on Church Planting is beginning its work to place church-planting efforts into motion for the Episcopal Church. Grant applications for church starts and missional initiatives are available here. The advisory group was established through Resolution D005 calling for the creation of "a churchwide network for planting congregations, training and recruiting planters; and establishing new congregations each triennium." The advisory group is also working to support and develop new Spanish-speaking and bilingual congregations, and has been charged with the distribution of further funding for Missional Enterprise Zones. The advisory group has announced a design contest for a new **logo** depicting a renewed church planting movement across the church. Submission instructions are available here. The contest deadline is May 1. • A variety of Episcopal Church **scholarships**, derived from annual income from designated trust funds, are available for the 2016-2017 academic year. Applicants must be Episcopalians and have the endorsement of their bishop. The application deadline is April 30. More information, including the application, is available here.
