Registration is open for **Ministry Discernment** Conference

Bishop Carol Gallagher appointed assistant bishop

Bishop Gayle Harris Leadership Development Fund accepting gifts

Registration is now open, here, for the annual Ministry Discernment Conference offered by Bishop Gates and the Commission on Ministry, to be held online this year on Saturday, Feb. 4, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. This conference will provide an in-depth look at the 2023 edition of the Ministry Discernment Handbook and give potential inquirers an opportunity to learn about the ordination process in the Diocese of Massachusetts as they consider whether their call is to ordained ministry or committed lay ministry.

Any person considering applying for admission to the ordination process in 2023 is required to attend the conference, along with a sponsoring priest and at least one member of the parish discernment committee.

Harris will complete her work in the diocese as of Dec. 31 of this year and then take sabbatical time ahead of her official retirement date of March 31.

of awareness and knowledge of racial equity culture and will help gauge perceptions of the environment for decision makers, staff and community members.

REDI survey results are 100 percent confidential and are reported only in the aggregate, in a continuum format, with suggested areas to develop based on a final REDI score. This assessment will be used as a baseline in 2022 and can be taken again in the future to measure progress toward race equity goals.

The series provides individuals, small groups, congregations, ministry teams and other communities with "an opportunity for a communal and embodied experience, encouraging participants to go past thinking about the concept of truth to really experiencing the practice of truth-telling, however uncomfortable that may seem, and to examine how that feels 'in their bones,' " according to subcommittee member Leonie Drummond of the Church of the Holy Spirit in Mattapan, in this January 2022 E-news article.

The series includes six sessions, two hours each. The materials are designed to facilitate a collective community process without the need for an instructor or leader's guide—part of the richness and the challenge of the series, according to subcommittee leaders. • **Episcopal Church 2021 Parochial Report data now available:** The Episcopal Church's newly released <u>2021 Parochial Report re-</u><u>sults</u> show an increase in overall giving amid challenges presented by pivots to online and hybrid worship since 2020.

The 2021 statistics—which include data from 2019-2021—continue to reflect the hardships faced by Episcopal congregations, which varied widely in the number of Sundays they were able to worship in person. While in-person average Sunday attendance declined 35 percent in 2021 over the previous year's count, overall membership in The Episcopal Church measured only a 3 percent decline. A surprise finding—particularly given the drop in attendance—was that funds collected through offerings and pledges ("plate and pledge") increased by 3 percent.
