Join Bishop Alan M. Gates at the 53rd annual Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial Breakfast, which takes place on *Monday, Jan. 16 at 9 a.m.* at the Boston Convention and Exhibition Center, featuring this year as guest speaker Jelani Cobb, a writer for *The New Yorker* magazine and Columbia Journalism School dean. The breakfast represents over 50 years of commemoration and collaboration between St. Cyprian's Episcopal Church and Union United Methodist Church to present this annual event dedicated to King's life and legacy. The MLK Breakfast Committee also recognizes extraordinary contributions to diversity and inclusion efforts through service and scholarships.

Registration is now open, here, for the annual Ministry Discernment Conference offered by the bishops and the Commission on Ministry, to be held online on *Saturday, Feb. 4, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.* This conference will provide an in-depth look at the 2023 edition of the Ministry Discernment Handbook and give potential inquirers an opportunity to learn about the ordination process in the Diocese of Massachusetts as they consider whether their call is to ordained ministry or committed lay ministry.

Any person considering applying for admission to the ordination process in 2023 is required to attend the conference, along with a sponsoring priest and at least one member of the parish discernment committee.

Parochial Report filing site now open

New question reports count on race/ethnicity

Zoom seminars scheduled to assist with Parochial Report preparation The filing site for the 2022 Parochial Report is now open for congregations to begin reporting their data. The General Convention Office sent an e-mail on Dec. 6 to congregation leaders with instructions. Reports from congregations are **due by March 1** and must be submitted on the filing site. See the <u>Parochial Report Information page</u> on the General Convention website for forms and instructions. If log-in assistance is needed, contact diocesan staff member Nathaniel Fasman, Human Resources Administrator (<u>nfasman@diomass.org</u>).

The Parochial Report is the oldest continuous gathering of data by The Episcopal Church. For the 2022 Parochial Report, qualitative data will again be collected through narrative questions along with the quantitative data that has been gathered historically. **New this year:** "Sacraments and Services" will be reported by in-person, hybrid or online services. Additionally, under "Membership, Attendance and Services," a new Question 3 asks for a count and percentage of total active participants within a list of racial/ethnic categories.

Interested in vital information on your congregation? The Episcopal Church's General Convention Office provides <u>online tools for exploring Parochial Report trends</u>, including 10-year history of attendance, pledge and plate income and membership for individual Episcopal churches.

With the deadline for submission of the **annual Parochial Report** on March 1, the Congregational Consultants are leading Zoom **seminars on its preparation**. The Rev. Cynthia Hubbard, long-time priest and former canon for transition ministry, will make a presentation twice on the **non-financial sections** on *Tuesday*, *Jan. 17 at 9 a.m.* (register here) and *Saturday*, *Jan. 21 at 9 a.m.* (register here). The **financial section** will be explained by Terry Robinson, longtime Congregational Consultant and parish auditor, on *Tuesday*, *Jan. 31 at 9 a.m.* (register here) and again on *Saturday*, *Feb. 4 at 9 a.m.* (register here).

Congregation treasurers seeking suggestions for things to address as the financial books are closed at year's end will find a recording of the recently run seminar on that subject here, along with recordings of all the seminars on the practical aspects of congregational leadership that the Congregational Consultants have done in recent years—more than a dozen.

• "Ways to Join the Campaign to Shrink The Racial Wealth Gap in MA": On Wednesday, Jan. 25, 6-7 p.m., come learn about Episcopal City Mission's new statewide campaign on shrinking the racial wealth gap in Massachusetts, and find out ways to get involved in the three areas of work: reparations; solidarity economy and investing; and state-level policy change.

This spring, ECM will be hosting a 3-6 month program for Episcopal groups and individuals with a focus on action toward reparations and the wealth gap. This program will be a particularly good fit for individuals and groups that have already done some racial justice education, such as the <u>Sacred Ground series</u> or the <u>Reparations Toolkit</u> offered by the Diocese of Massachusetts, and who are looking for what action steps they can take next.

The program will be a spiritually grounded space for personal transformation, relationship building, both joy and reckoning and, most of all, concrete and bold action in the world. Plans include space for caucus groups by race and possibly class identity, to recognize that, while we all have ways we can contribute, the responsibility of closing the racial wealth gap most directly falls into the hands of white communities who have benefited from unfair advantages throughout this nation's history.

• The **Lenten study series "What is Truth,"** commissioned by the Racial Justice Commission's Subcommittee on Reparations as part of its <u>Reparations Toolkit</u>, is still available for use in 2023.

The series provides individuals, small groups, congregations, ministry teams and other communities with "an opportunity for a communal and embodied experience, encouraging participants to go past thinking about the concept of truth to really experiencing the practice of truth-telling, however uncomfortable that may seem, and to examine how that feels 'in their bones,' "according to subcommittee member Leonie Drummond of the Church of the Holy Spirit in Mattapan, in this <u>January 2022 E-news article</u>.

The series includes six sessions, two hours each. The materials are designed to facilitate a collective community process without the need for an instructor or leader's guide—part of the richness and the challenge of the series, according to subcommittee leaders. Life Together strives to create a supportive space for the next generation of prayerful and prophetic leaders to grow and thrive. An initiative of the Diocese of Massachusetts and a member of the Episcopal Service Corps, Life Together is a 10-month fellowship that matches young adults (21-32 years of age) with mission-based nonprofit organizations, schools and churches in the greater Boston area. - New, certified Spanish and French translations of the 1979 Book of Common Prayer are available online. Printed copies will be available Jan. 20. An additional translation into Haitian Creole is forthcoming. The translations were prepared under the supervision of the Task Force for Liturgical Translations, a subcommittee of the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music. The new translations were called for by the 2018 General Convention through resolution A070 and included an opportunity for churchwide feedback last fall. Find more information here.
