• Chaplains to the retired clergy of the diocese were first recruited so that the retired and their spouses, widows and widowers would not "go off the radar" of attention in the diocese. Additionally, the pastoral ministry of the Church Pension Fund is supportive in keeping in touch with both newly retired and longtime retired clergy and families. There are many resources available for guidance in the retirement years.

In recent years, the chaplains have sponsored lunch meetings that have featured speakers of interest to the retired. Because the distances to travel to these meetings has been difficult for some, plans are being developed for more local meetings on a deanery basis. The chaplains welcome ideas of those who would like to be involved in these programs.

• Piano donation e-mail scam: Among the numerous and everevolving online "phishing" scams targeting churches and church people is one recently making the rounds with an offer to donate a piano. Replying to or accepting the offer can result in invoices for moving costs and/or persistent requests for payment or financial information. Though churches do sometimes receive legitimate piano donation offers, err on the side of caution. Don't click on any links, and if unsure or unable to verify, don't reply.

CHURCHWIDE:

• Encouraging Episcopalians to apply and make referrals for churchwide positions, committees and boards, the Joint Standing Committee on Nominations offers six informational videos—in English with Spanish subtitles—about what each group does and what qualifications new members should have.

The committee opened nominations in February and recently extended the application deadline to *April 30*. Application forms are available <u>here</u> in English, French and Spanish. • The 2023 grant funding cycle for **Episcopal Church creation care grants** is open, with <u>applications</u>—available in English and Spanish—due by *May 1* for local and regional eco-ministry projects.

Overseen by the church's Task Force on Creation Care and Environmental Racism, creation care grants support projects that address climate change, environmental degradation and the inequitable and systemic impacts of environmental racism. The grant committee is interested in programs that go beyond secular environmental work to provide resources for faith-based community organizing and theological reflection. Projects that support Episcopal Church efforts to reach the goal of net carbon neutrality by 2030 will be favorably considered, along with projects that develop climate change resiliency. Up to 12 projects—ranging from \$8,000 to \$25,000 each—will be awarded to Episcopal institutions.

Three festival "tents"—devoted to evangelism, creation care and racial reconciliation—will each offer an evening revival worship service and major plenary speaker, plus dozens of daytime workshops, panels, practice opportunities and other ways to engage. Participants can stick with one tent or explore across the tents, following the themes of worship and liturgy, formation, justice and advocacy, leadership, preaching, stewardship, youth and children.
