Listening sessions with Bishop Nominating Committee are underway Diocesan Convention takes place *Friday-Saturday, Oct. 27-28* at the DoubleTree by Hilton Hotel in Danvers. Convention is open to all in the diocesan community and includes non-business programming on Friday exploring this year's theme, "In Christ, Called to Collaborate." Registration, Friday program information and other details are at www.diomass.org/diocesan-convention-2023.

Pre-Convention Forums, online via Zoom, offer an important opportunity for discussion about the issues and business to come before the Diocesan Convention, including the proposed 2024 diocesan budget and proposed resolutions. New ecumenical & inter- religious officer named	Bishop Alan M. Gates has appointed the Rev. Dr. Daniel Joslyn- Siemiatkoski, Kraft Family Professor and Director of the Center for Christian-Jewish Learning at Boston College, to serve as an ecumenical and interreligious officer for the diocese, together with Jane C. Redmont who has served in the role since 2018. As officers, they serve as official representatives of the diocese at ecumenical and interreligious events, provide updates to the Diocesan Council and the wider diocese on important developments in relationships with religious companions and partners, keep track of official actions of The Episcopal Church which may affect local partnerships, and provide advice to the bishops and resources and encouragement to congregations. They also co-chair the dioc- esan Commission for Ecumenical and Interreligious Relations. "I am honored to serve with the people of the diocese in this capacity. In our increasingly polarized age, finding ways for com- munities of faith to work together for the common good is vitally important," Joslyn-Siemiatkoski said. "The Diocese of Massachu- setts has long supported the work of ecumenical and interreligious relations and I am excited to collaborate with my colleague Jane Redmont as the next chapter of that history unfolds."

NEWS & EVENT NOTES:

• **Annual Enrollment**—the period when eligible employees can make changes to their enrollment in medical and dental insurance without a qualifying event—**is** *Oct. 11-Nov. 1*.

The Church Pension Group (CPG) has decided to switch dental insurance providers for 2024. **This means that all employees who would like dental insurance in 2024 must log on to the CPG portal to select their desired plan.** Any employee who does not select a dental plan for 2024 will not have access to that insurance for the new plan year. CPG will send reminder e-mails to all currently enrolled employees who have not yet selected a dental plan to make sure they remember to do so. More details about the new dental insurance provider are available on the <u>CPG Delta Dental microsite</u>.

CPG will be sending e-mails to all enrolled members with information on how to make their choices for next year. Any employees who are eligible but not currently enrolled should contact Nathaniel Fasman, Human Resources Administrator, at <u>nfasman@diomass.</u> org if they would like to enroll in health or dental insurance for 2024. • Old North Illuminated will present "Their Chosen Faith: Women of Color in the 19th-Century Episcopal Church," an online talk by Dr. Jaimie Crumley, on *Thursday*, Oct. 19, 7-8:30 p.m.

Starting in the 1780s, many northern states either abolished slavery (in the case of Massachusetts) or promised enslaved people their gradual emancipation. While coercion continued to define the lives of free people of color, the end of slavery offered more opportunities for them to explore their faith, and some women and men of African descent made Episcopal churches in the urban North (including Old North Church) their spiritual homes. In her talk, Crumley will discuss how the dynamic between women of African descent and Episcopal churches in the urban North shifted after the American Revolution.

• On Saturday, Nov. 4, the St. Paul Center for Theology and Prayer is hosting Dr. Rowan Williams, former archbishop of Canterbury and prominent theologian, whose subject will be "The Learning Church: Theology and Christian Maturity." The event will be hosted at the Cathedral Church of St. Paul in Boston *from 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.*, with Williams speaking at 10 a.m. and available for questions and discussion until noon. He will join the event virtually from his home in Wales.

The full day at the cathedral will be a time to grow in community, learn with Williams and one another and be resourced for the task of forming disciples in congregations. A diocesan committee needs time to review applications and make a recommendation to the bishop before the churchwide UTO deadline of Jan. 19.

• Episcopal institutions are invited to apply for **churchwide evangelism grants** to support local and regional efforts to grow Episcopal ministries, resources and gatherings. The application deadline is *Oct. 13*. The grant application, criteria, requirements, budget information and more are available online <u>here</u> in English, Spanish and French.

The grants committee will consider proposals for up to \$2,000 for individual faith communities and up to \$8,000 for multichurch, diocesan, provincial and other regional collaborations. A total of \$125,000 is available for this funding cycle. The 2023 grant focus is on evangelism initiatives that minister across barriers.

The Episcopal Evangelism grants program began in 2017 in response to the 2015 General Convention's increased investment in evangelism. The program is coordinated by the Executive Council Joint Standing Committee on Mission Within The Episcopal Church in collaboration with evangelism staff.

• **Global Partnership Grants** are now available. Two types of grants are available to churches, schools and organizations affiliated with the Diocese of Massachusetts:

• **Companion Relationship Grants** help launch or sustain relationships between people of this diocese and partners around the world. Grants are limited to one grant per year for a maximum of five years, with a maximum grant of \$12,000 in the launch year and \$6,000 in succeeding years.

• **Sustainable Development Grants** are designed to strengthen existing relationships where a particular development opportunity aligns with the U.N. Sustainable Development Goals. Grants are limited to one grant per year of up to \$25,000, with a maximum of three grants per project, or a maximum total grant of \$75,000.

Both grants require matching funds from the Diocese of Massachusetts partner, with the amount defined by the partner's budget size. Find guidelines and application links for each of these programs <u>here</u>.
