## Bishop Nominating Committee receiving applications by Jan. 13

Online education opportunities: "Profile Overview" & "What is the Role of a Bishop?"

Prompt attention needed for 2024 Leadership Report process soon to be underway Bishop Alan Gates welcomes applications from clergy and lay members of the diocese seeking appointment to the newly forming Reparations Fund Committee.

The Reparations Fund Committee will be an active and working committee, with the authority to discern, oversee, direct and report on all reparations payments, disbursements, investments and other financial transactions to further the fund's mission. The Fund Committee will comprise 11 members (both clergy and lay) appointed by the bishop diocesan, a majority of whom will identify as African American or Afro Caribbean. Applicants should be lay members in good standing of a congregation in the diocese or clergy who are canonically resident or licensed to serve in the diocese. The online application form is available <u>here</u> for those who would like to be considered for appointment to the Fund Committee; the deadline to submit an application is *Wednesday, Jan. 31*.

The Nominating Committee for the election of the diocese's next bishop opened the nomination and application process on Dec. 5, and is accepting applications until *Jan. 13* (nominations closed on Dec. 30). The diocesan profile, available at <u>www.diomass.</u> <u>org/bishop-search/profile</u>, contains application instructions.

The Nominating Committee invites all members of the diocese to an online education opportunity on *Wednesday, Jan. 24 at 7 p.m.*, focusing on "What is the Role of a Bishop?" Registration, <u>here</u>, is required to receive the Zoom link. A recording of the Dec. 14 session, "Diocesan Profile Overview," is available <u>here</u>.

The information provided through this report is critical to make sure that important diocesan information reaches congregations' current leaders in the upcoming year. As there will be a bishop election on *May 18, 2024*, it's imperative that congregations submit delegate data in a timely manner.

We are reminded throughout Scripture that God has formed an everlasting covenant with us. This covenant is an invitation to enter into relationship with God and to act together in harmony with one another and all the earth. In launching the 2024 Bishops' Annual Appeal, the bishops invite everyone to join in deepening covenants formed as the Diocese of Massachusetts.

A goal of \$200,000 has been set for the 2024 Bishops' Annual Appeal in support of shared mission as a diocesan community committed to being disciples of Jesus, seekers of justice and protectors of creation.

The bishops ask clergy and wardens to promote the Bishops' Annual Appeal locally: Announce it in your congregations and distribute materials directly to your people. While congregations may conduct a Bishops' Annual Appeal Ingathering on any Sunday, the bishops ask that congregations consider designating the *fourth Sunday in Lent, March 10*, as Bishops' Annual Appeal Ingathering Sunday.
