Online registration is open, <u>here</u>, for the 239th annual Diocesan Convention, to take place on *Saturday*, *Nov.* 9 at the Marriott Boston Quincy Hotel in Quincy. Early registration is encouraged.

She will be seated as the 17th bishop diocesan of the Diocese of Massachusetts the following day, *Sunday, Oct. 20 at 5 p.m.* at the Cathedral Church of St. Paul in Boston. **More details—including registration for general seating, livestreaming and regional watch parties—will be announced soon.**

Season of Creation observed Sept. 1-Oct. 4

With the *Sept. 1-Oct. 4* Season of Creation approaching, the Creation Care Justice Network offers an updated collection of resources and suggestions for use by congregations and individuals, available here. Among them are:

- Episcopal Path to Creation Justice now enrolling for fall: After a successful pilot phase, An Episcopal Path to Creation Justice is growing this fall. Congregations around Province I can sign up by the end of August to explore their unique path. Participating congregations will have a trained companion walking with them as they discern how they can deepen their commitment to caring for creation by praying, learning, acting and advocating. Path participants will also be in fellowship with each other via monthly Zoom gatherings. Congregations interested in participating are invited to contact the project managers, the Rev. - The 2024 edition of "Season of Creation: A Celebration Guide for Episcopal Parishes" is now available. Created in 2022 and first published for the dioceses of Western Massachusetts and Massachusetts, the liturgical guide has expanded this year to include a new Daily Office guide for lay-led services and expanded and diversified readings, among other additions and improvements. The guide has been authorized for use in more than 40 dioceses—including Massachusetts—and is available at https://newcreationliturgies.org/season.
