# Registration is open for annual Diocesan Convention

Open comment period and Pre-Convention Forums: Save these dates and plan to participate! **Friday, Sept. 6** is the final day to submit materials to the Convention Office, including nomination forms for elected positions, proposed resolutions and written reports for Diocesan Convention, taking place *Saturday, Nov. 9* at the Marriott Boston Quincy Hotel in Quincy. Registration and submission links and other details can be found at <a href="https://www.diomass.org/diocesan-convention-2024">www.diomass.org/diocesan-convention-2024</a>.

An **open comment period** on proposed resolutions runs *Sept. 13-18*, with a Zoom discussion scheduled for *Tuesday*, *Sept. 17 at 7 p.m.* Register here. (An online feedback form will also be available during the comment period.) This is an opportunity to offer feedback and ask questions about proposed resolutions before they are distributed in final form for the convention's consideration.

# • Consultants needed to shepherd parishes in transition:

Currently in the diocese there is a large number of congregations in the priest-in-charge process, and there is a need for consultants who can help guide these churches and priests on their path. Those who have served in lay or clergy leadership in congregations, have been a member of a search committee or have skills in discernment, development or human resources may be well-suited for this role. Training is available.

Ideally, consultants would commit to a congregation for three years, but some people may be drawn to the work for certain years or particular points in the discernment process. Roughly, the first year involves getting to know each other; the second year is envisioning the future for the congregation; and the third year is a discernment process to decide whether the priest-in-charge is the right candidate for rector and if the candidate discerns a calling to remain as rector.
