# Deacons available to preach on "Diaconate Sunday" June 15

On *Sunday, June 15*, the Diocese of Massachusetts, along with other dioceses in New England, will celebrate Diaconate Sunday. Congregations are invited to request a deacon to preach on that day, chosen in proximity to the Sunday when the church celebrates St. Efrem the Syrian, a deacon venerated in both Eastern and Western traditions.

Diaconate Sunday is an opportunity to introduce more congregations to the life and work of deacons. To request a deacon for June 15, contact the Ven. Chris Beukman, Archdeacon for Deployment and Pastoral Care (<a href="mailto:cbeukman@diomass.org">cbeukman@diomass.org</a>).

Because there are more congregations than deacons, congregations are encouraged to make their requests as soon as possible before May 1 if they would like a deacon to be present with them on June 15.

## NEWS & EVENT NOTES:

• Audit reminder from the Congregational Consultants: Now that the Parochial Report has been filed and the Annual Meeting has been held, it is time to prepare for the annual financial audit. According to the Constitution and Canons of The Episcopal Church, all parishes and missions must complete an annual audit, submitting it to the diocesan Treasurer's Office by Sept. 1. Recorded webinars about the audit process are available <a href="here">here</a>.

Diocesan audit submission procedures have been updated, and only electronic copies of congregations' annual financial audits are now being accepted. Audit packages should be e-mailed to <u>audits@diomass.org</u>. The package should include the auditor's report, findings and recommendations, completed audit checklist, the fiscal year balance sheet and income and expense statement, along with the written response from the vestry to the audit comments and recommendations. With audits due by Sept. 1, it is recommended that congregations schedule their audit now so that it can be completed on time. Participants will learn about <u>An Episcopal Path to Creation Justice</u>; discover how to spend less on buildings and free up resources for mission through the <u>Community Purchasing Alliance</u>; hear about equipping and empowering their congregations with <u>Invite Welcome Connect</u> resources; explore new and updated Safe Church resources; meet new Regional Canon Marissa Rohrbach; and get acquainted with wardens and vestry members from other churches.

• Church Home Society invites Tripp Award nominees: The Church Home Society was established in the 1800s by the Diocese of Massachusetts to care for orphans and youth, and is now an independent not-for-profit that funds church and secular organizations that aid underresourced youth. In 2010 the society's trustees created an annual award of \$10,000 in honor of long-time trustee and financial supporter William V. Tripp III. This award recognizes an organization or church that furthers the mission of helping disadvantaged youth. The Church Home Society invites submissions of names of organizations or groups to be considered for the award; e-mail submissions to tchs@diomass.org.

Last year's recipient was Care 4 Kids, a ministry of the Church of the Holy Spirit in Orleans. Other past recipients have been Amazing Grace of Cape Cod, and Trinity Church in Rockland.

- Three Saturday morning **Eucharistic Visitor trainings** are being offered this spring in partnership with the St. Paul Center for Theology and Prayer. Eucharistic Visitors extend the altar to include those who are homebound or in the hospital. This important pastoral and liturgical ministry is offered by adult lay members of the congregation who are certified by the diocese. In order to be certified, Eucharistic Visitors must complete Safe Church training, be nominated by their priest and attend a diocesan-approved training. Trainings are scheduled in each region of the diocese, 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. on:
  - April 26 at Grace Church in Medford;
  - May 3 at St. David's Church in South Yarmouth; and
  - May 10 at the Church of Our Redeemer in Lexington.

• Episcopal City Mission (ECM) will present a spring offering of "A Stolen Beam: Essential Conversation and Spiritual Reflection on Reparations for Descendants of Slaves in the U.S."

Facilitated by Dr. Constance Holmes and the Rev. Steven Bonsey, this seven-session course of educational engagement and personal reflection, which originated from the Jewish Community of Amherst, examines the historical case for reparations; global and national precedents for reparations; practical proposals for national and local reparations; and theological reflections on reparations from Jewish and Christian sources. The Stolen Beam course has been offered throughout the U.S.; ECM's offering will incorporate contemplative practices in the Christian wisdom tradition as well as opportunities for discernment in community.

Voted to approve 2025 assessment adjustments for All Saints' Church in Attleboro, St. Paul's Church in Newburyport, St. Paul's Church in Lynnfield, St. Dunstan's Church in Dover and St. Paul's Church in North Andover.
