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2025 Clergy Professional Development Day

Registration is available [here](#) for the remaining sessions of the 2025 Clergy Professional Development Day, offered in two parts on Tuesday, September 23, and Wednesday, September 24, on Zoom. Part I is a workshop from Braver Angels on how to understand the values and concerns of those who differ politically, consistent with the call to be ambassadors of reconciliation (2 Cor. 5:19-20). The goal is to build bridges across divides and share beliefs in ways that support community and promote transformation. All clergy are encouraged to take advantage of this workshop.

For clergy who are due (or overdue) to refresh Safe Church requirements in 2025, Part II is a Safe Church/Title IV Review which fulfills the refresher requirement, along with attendance at a Part I workshop and assigned online training.

New Toolkit for Addressing Antisemitism

A new toolkit for addressing antisemitism in church practices, developed by Rev. Dr. Daniel Joslyn-Siemiatkoski and Rev. Emily J. Garcia, as well as Rev. Reebee Kavich Girash (United Church of Christ) as part of Lexington United Against Antisemitism's (LUAA's) Christian Reflection Working Group, is now [available](#). This resource is offered to "clergy, music directors, directors of religious education, and lay leaders to use in locating and uprooting manifestations of antisemitism in Christian communal life and practice." This toolkit is an outgrowth of conversations and presentations that have been taking place since 2023. In that year, the Rev. Dr. Daniel Joslyn-Siemiatkoski presented at an interfaith event hosted by Temple Emunah in Lexington about combating antisemitism, and the following January-March 2024, he presented at our diocesan Clergy Professional Development Days about "Speaking Truthfully: Avoiding Anti-Judaism in Holy Week." The interfaith event prompted the creation of LUAA and the development of the toolkit.

Event: Indigenous People's Day Deer Island Pilgrimage

Date: October 13, 2025, SAVE THE DATE!

Location: Natick, MA, to Deer Island

Join the Diocese of Massachusetts and the Diocese of Western Massachusetts this fall as we mark the 350th anniversary of the beginning of Metacomb's Rebellion (King Philip's War) with a pilgrimage from Natick, MA, to Deer Island—the internment site where hundreds of Native people from the “praying towns” died from exposure and starvation in the winter of 1675-1676.

This spiritual experience of place, presence and still reflection will be guided by Native neighbors, supported by Episcopal communities, and include the bishops of both dioceses. This fall's events are a small step along the path toward justice that both Bishop Doug Fisher (EDOWMa) and Bishop Julia Whitworth called us into as dioceses in their recent joint statement endorsing the MA Indigenous Legislative Agenda.

More information about preparation for the October 13 pilgrimage, registration for the buses, and opportunities for individual congregational witness on October 12 will be shared in the months ahead.

At its June 26 meeting, the Diocesan Council:

- Heard updates from Bishop Whitworth.
- Heard and discussed a presentation of draft Diocesan Mission, Core Values, Strategic Priorities, and Organizational Foundations, based on the consultancy work with Ministry Architects.
- Voted to approve an assessment adjustment for St. Dunstan's, Dover and St. James, Groveland.
- Reviewed the summary draft budget for 2026.
- Approved recommendations from the Budget Committee to allocate bequests and other capital income to fund deficits in reserve and capital accounts.
- Heard from the Secretary that Diocesan Convention will take place November 14-15 in Burlington, MA, with the theme, "The Hope to which we are Called" (from the Letter to the Ephesians).
